

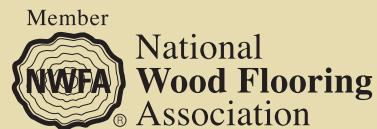
## All About Your Wood Floor

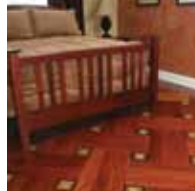
To accomplish that, there are some things you will need to know about your floor. All of that information is included in this brochure so that you will have it in one convenient place for years to come.

## Installation Conditions

The condition of your home when your floor is installed will have an impact on how your floor performs long-term. Things like the temperature of your home, humidity levels and air circulation can impact the performance of your floor. In general, your floor should be installed under the same conditions as you normally live, without huge extremes in temperature, humidity or air circulation. For the optimal performance of your floor, the temperature of your home should be maintained between 68 degrees to 78 degrees, with relative humidity levels between 30% to 50%.
